Sprint Generation Challenge' Gold Medal awarded today

€40,000 to the Student Team for a Project on the Protection of the Endangered Bluefin **Tuna Species**

Turin, January 15 - Alongside the scientific debate held yesterday during the FISU WORLD CONFE-RENCE, the final phase of the #TO25Brainstorm Project took place today. This initiative, a "brainstorm and challenge among minds" launched by the Organizing Committee in 2022, has been conducted in national and international universities with the support of the Turin Chamber of Commerce: the Sprint Generation Challenge.

The initiative was launched with the active involvement of four Piedmontese Universities (Univesità degli Studi di Torino, Politecnico di Torino, Università del Piemonte Orientale, and Università di Scienze Gastronomiche) and with contributions of the Chamber of Commerce to foster innovative ideas on nine scientific themes linked to current issues and challenges (climate change, energy sustainability, and the ability to create social cohesion and new work models). The #TO25Brainstorm project led to the selection of **33 teams** who participated in the Sprint Generation Challenge finals.

Each team presented a project summary poster for the challenge. The contest culminated today, January 15, with the Sprint Generation Awards event at the Cavallerizza Reale, where all teams were invited to participate.

During the event, the top 10 teams were announced







and discussed their projects before the panel and the Winter as part of an exhibition aimed at high school audience. 
NDOOR SPORTS MOVE FORWARD THEIR LONG JOURNEY TOWARD THE MEDALS

After yesterday's events, which saw the first medals awarded in mixed doubles curling, Palattazzoli hosted the start of a new challenge today. The Men's Round Robin Session began with initial matches where Sweden, Canada, Italy, Norway, and the Republic of Korea triumphed over Ukraine, Switzerland, China, United States, and United Kingdom, respectively. CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING & PARA CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING, INDIVIDUAL (F) M/W



PRAGELATO PLAN, 15 January – The breathtaking trails of Pragelato Plan set the stage for a thrilling day of cross-country skiing at the 32nd FISU World University Games Winter. Under beautiful, sunny weather with spring-like conditions, athletes pushed their endurance to the limit in the 10 km individual freestyle races for both men and women in Cross Country and Para Cross Country.

Men's 10 km Individual Freestyle: High altitude, high speed

It was a battle of speed and stamina, but in the end, **Olaf Martin Aaserud Talmo** (NOR) proved unstoppable, crossing the finish line in 24:21.0 to claim gold. Finland's **Nico Bennert** put up a strong fight,



finishing just 6.8 seconds behind, while Bulgaria's **Mario Matikanov** secured bronze with a time of 24:38.2, rounding out an impressive podium.

Winner: Olaf TALMO (NOR)

The last lap was absolutely awful. The altitude makes it very hard to ski, but I tried to push the entire way. The race was very hard, but I felt good. I think I got it at the end. I retired two years ago, now I just ski for fun, so it was a surprise for me to win the race. I never thought I would finish on the podium. I will dedicate my medal to my university, lots of people – not just athletes but also the wax technicians – are from the university and they all just did amazing work today. I also love how professional everything around these competitions here is, I am not used to It's such an important medal, and even more important is it, to beat all my other friends from the Finish team (laughs). Everybody told me to start slowly and increase the pace for the last lap and that's what I did and the wax technicians have done an amazing job today, so it really went perfect today.

I study sports science in Norway, and they gave me perfect conditions for training in the morning and have the lessons in the afternoon. So it's all arranged around the training, that is nice.

Para Cross-Country Standing (10 km): Outstanding victory

Germany's **Marco Maier** (LW6 - 96%) stormed to victory with an adjusted time of 22:37.3, demonstrating remarkable control and power on the course. **Denis**

Zinov (KAZ, LW3 - 87%) took silver, finishing with an adjusted time of 26:02.6, nearly four minutes back. Armenia's **Garik Melkonyan** (LW6 - 95%) put in a valiant effort to secure bronze in 26:28.6, making for a hard-fought competition.

Winner: Marco MAIER (GER)

Nice result, I am very happy with the race. Of course, it's not a World Cup competition, you have to be able to categorise that, but I'm still satisfied. I started a bit fast, which I felt at the end, but otherwise I felt really good and the tracks were also very good. I'll do my best in the next race too, even though classic isn't really my discipline, I'll have to see what happens.

Para Cross-Country Visually Impaired (10

km): Finnish triumph

Finland's **Inkki Inola** (NS3 - 100%), guided by Reetu Inkila, dominated the field with an unchallenged pace, finishing in 22:51.4. Germany's **Lennart Mattis Volkert** (NS2 - 97%), guided by Nils Kolb, followed in second with an adjusted time of 23:33.4, while Kazakhstan's **Roman Kurbanov** (NS3 - 100%), guided by Anton Zhdanovich, completed the podium in 28:17.1.

Winner: Inkki INOLA (FIN)

It's a great feeling! The race was very hard, but I enjoy skiing. My skis were excellent today! My guide did also a very good job. I dedicate this medal to my parents, coach and sponsors.

Second: Lennart Mattis VOLKERT (GER)

I'm happy about the silver medal, it's just cool to



be here, it's such a cool event. I just wanted to do a good race beforehand and I can definitely be happy with myself today, it was a solid race. My thighs were burning at the end, but that's how it has to be. It was really nice to run here in this weather, but it's nevertheless exhausting. I want to have another good race in the next race and take my confidence into the rest of the season, even though classic skiing is not my discipline.

Women's 10 km Individual Freestyle: Crowd pleaser finishes second

Poland's Izabela Marcisz put on a masterclass in endurance and power, claiming the gold medal with a dominant time of 28:08.7. Her victory was built on a fast start and a relentless pace that no one could match in the closing kilometers. The loudest cheers of the day, however, were for Italy's Maria Eugenia Boccardi, who secured silver in 28:11.6, finishing just 2.9 seconds behind Marcisz. The home crowd roared as Boccardi put in a gutsy performance, keeping the race for gold alive until the very last stretch. Rounding out the podium, Switzerland's Carla Nina Wohler crossed the finish line in 28:23.2, taking bronze 14.5 seconds behind the winner. Wohler's well-paced effort allowed her to hold off a competitive chasing pack - among them her twin sister Gianna Chiaria who finished 6th -, securing a well-earned spot on the podium.

Winner: Izabela MARCISZ (POL)

I tried to fight till the end. I heard at the top of the hill, that I was 28 seconds ahead and at the finish line realized it was only three seconds. I tried to fight till the end, because I was super tired. But I am really happy that I won. Of course it was my goal, like for



everyone else in this field. I dedicate this medal to my coach and my parents, especially my mum. She was for sure super stressed and I hope she is really proud of me.

Second: Maria Eugenia BOCCARDI (ITA) I am very satisfied, because there were many athletes on the starting list who compete at a high level in the World Cup or World Championships and therefore it was not easy to stay ahead. For me today is extra cool, because it is always nice to represent Italy in international events, but today we are at home and that makes it even nicer!

I know in the end it was just 2.9 seconds, but on the track I really didn't listen to the times, my head was elsewhere and focusing on the race which I think I managed better than the athletes that started before me. It is very difficult for me with the studies – I attend the University of Environmental Engineering in Trento – because of the many trips I have to take for my competitions and training. So every now and then I have to give up something, but I am in my third year and I should be able to graduate.

Third: Carla Nina WOHLER (SUI)

It was a tough race, and I gave it everything I had, so I am really glad it paid off. The track was in perfect condition and everything else also is very well organized. I want to dedicate this medal to my twin sister; she is always pushing me so hard, and she would have really deserved a podium today as well. She finished in sixth place, so it is very nice to experience that together!

Para Cross-Country Visually Impaired (10 km) – Women: German dominance

It was a German one-two finish in the women's vi-

sually impaired 10 km freestyle, with Leonie Maria Walter (GER) and her guide Christian Krasman securing gold in an adjusted time of 25:37.9. Walter's strong pace and seamless coordination with her guide allowed her to control the race from start to finish. Teammate Johanna Recktenwald (GER), guided by Emily Rose Weiss, followed in second place with an adjusted time of 26:50.8, ensuring a dominant German presence on the podium.

Poland's **Aneta Kobryn**, guided by Katarzyna Witek, took bronze in 31:46.3

Winner: Leonie Marie WALTER (GER)

It's really cool that we can also run on the track with other Olympic athletes so that we can compare ourselves a bit. It would have been nice if we had also been allowed to run the 3.3 km course, but even so I'm happy that we were able to represent our sport and simply show what we can do. I tried to set a bit of a pace right from the start so that I had a lead and a bit of a buffer to hold on to until the end and just be on the safe side.

PREVIEW

The action in Pragelato continues on 16 January, when the biathlon single mixed relay will take place in Pragelato Rua, starting at 10:00. This fast-paced and highly tactical event will see teams of one male and one female athlete take turns skiing and shooting, making every shot count in the battle for gold. Expect dramatic lead changes, high-pressure shooting bouts, and intense sprint finishes as nations fight for a place on the podium.

Meanwhile, at Pragelato Plan, athletes will focus on preparation with official training sessions for the sprint (classic) races in cross-country and para cross-country skiing from 09:30 to 12:00.

Kazakhstan rules Dual Mogul Competitions

It was an incredible day for **Kazakhstan**: during the freestyle & freeski dual mogul competitions on **January 15th**, the east European country earned **three medals**: two for the women and one for the men. It's a tremendous achievement for both the athletes and their coaches.

After yesterday's exciting challenges, the athletes were back on the slopes to attempt to reach the big final in the dual moguls competition. Unlike single moguls, in which the racers compete one at a time, in this discipline two challengers tackle the downhill run in parallel. Speed is not enough, in order to achieve

the first place, technique and style are key skills. For example, it is very important for the judges that the skis remain as close to the ground as possible.

Furthermore, the dual moguls freestyle is a sport with great emotional input because the athletes often have to compete against their teammates. As it happened this afternoon when **Anastassiya Gorodko**, gold medallist in the women's single moguls, challenged her friend and compatriot **Ayalym Amrenovs**. The Kazakh athletes won first and second place respectively. An extremely heartfelt success for the head coach of the Kazakh team. The bronze medal

instead went to Japan's Marin Ito.

Gorodko talked about their victories expressing all her happiness at the success of Amrenova, whom she called "her best friend". Ayaulym also commented on today's competition, saying "we are not only teammates, we are a family. Today, together with Anastassiya, Kazakhstan won!".

As for the **men's podium**, the bronze medal went to the United States, with Jackson Edward Crockett. After the award ceremony he was happy and smiling, satisfied with his performance. He's particularly proud of his final jump, where he utilized horizontal power to cover as much distance as possible, outpacing his Kazakh opponent. Tomorrow, he returns home to prepare for his university exams. In March, he will then face the World Cup qualifiers. It's a hectic and busy life, but he's happy with these ac-

complishments. In second place, Japan with Shima Kawaoka. He, too, is bursting with joy and runs to embrace his teammates and the rest of the team. In first place, Anton Bondarev from Kazakhstan. "Today I was strong and angry about losing yesterday, that's why I was so fast," he said after his jump. He is thrilled for his country and for all the medals that were earned.

All the athletes hugged, exchanged handshakes, took group photos, and shared their flags. Not only among compatriots but also between representatives of different countries, the feelings were great. It was a good display of sportsmanship and fun. Freestyle skiing doesn't stop here: on January 16th, the qualifications for freestyle & freeski slopestyle will take place, and on the 17th, the medals will be awarded. Outstanding French performance only disturbed by Nyberg

Bardonecchia - Melezet, Wednesday 15 January -The Alpine Ski competitions of the 32nd FISU World University Games Winter opened today at Melezet, Wednesday, with the Alpine Combined Super-G and Slalom for the women. 34 women started in the morning with Super-G. The fastest three women on the Super-G took their advantage into the Slalom race in the afternoon and managed to maintain their position. The Alpine Combined competition was won by Emy Charbonnier from France, ahead of Sophie Nyberg from Sweden and Louison Accambray, also from France.





conditions were very good today. They did a lot of work in the last two days to make sure the track was good enough to race. Also the weather was great for racing! I didn't expect so much from this event, more from the other events, but I'm really happy. 'The atmosphere in our team is great, we're having lots of fun and at the same time we're competing at a high level. Bronze medallist Louison ACCAMBRAY (FRA): 'I'm really happy with my race, even though I could have hoped for a bit better. The organizers worked hard to make the track and conditions great. I'm not a Super-G specialist, so I was a little nervous, but it went really well, and the result speaks for itself. 'The team spirit in the French squad is what makes these results possible. There's such a great mentality, and starting tomorrow, we'll be there to cheer on the boys. 'I haven't started my school year yet, but I'm kicking off the sports season on a high note. I was in the U.S. in a university program, but I'll be back in France this year after an amazing experience. Now it's time to recover and focus on the upcoming races,

where I'll be ambitious and hope for more podium finishes?

4th place Ollier MARJOLAINE (FRA)




6th place Chloe MERLOZ (FRA)



DAY 4 OF TORINO 2025 FISU **IS READY TO ENTERTAIN US**

Torino 2025 FISU World University Games continue, with another day full of captivating events. On yesterday's programme, January 14th, we saw an incredible range of competitions, some of which were medalling. Such as: women's alpine combined slalom, hosted in Bardonecchia; men's and women's para cross-country skiing individual 10km in Pragelato Plan; men's and women's freestyle & freeski dual moguls, held in Bardonecchia; and men's and women's cross-country skiing individual 10 km. But enough with yesterday, an eventful day is around the corner. On today's programme we have two qualifications in Bardonecchia: men's and women's freestyle & freeski slopestyle from 10 am to 12 pm; and men's and women's snowboard slopestyle from 1 pm to 3 pm. In the morning, the first session on women's

curling round robin begins at Torino Palatazzoli, leading up to the second session at 7 pm. Men's curling round robin session 2, also begins today, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. It's the opening day for figure skating at Palavela, with the ice dance rhythm dance at 3:30 pm and the men's single skating short programme at 6 pm. Torino Palatazzoli, on the other hand, will host two hockey matches: Kazakhstan-United States at 4:30 pm and Japan-Czech Republic at 8 pm. That's not all for today's hockey competitions: Sweden and Canada will compete in Pinerolo at 8pm, while Polonia and Slovakia at 8pm in Torre Pellice. 
