
CURLING

HUNTING FOR THE WINNING PUCK: MEN'S HOCKEY TOWARD THE FINAL

Everything is ready for the men's ice hockey final to be held tonight at Pala Tazzoli in Turin: competing will be **Slovakia and Canada**, the winning teams of the two semi-finals held yesterday. The Slovak team defeated the Ukrainian team by a score of 3-1 in the first semi final at 4:00 pm. The boys from the Canadian team, on the other hand, triumphed in the second semi-final, which began at 8:00 p.m., beating the United States by an impressive 10 points to 2. Our microphones had the pleasure of asking **Canadian defender and captain Jack Duff** a few questions. The Queen's University Kingston student is clear in his thinking: «We're here for the gold medal game. We're super excited as a group and not satisfied unless we get the gold, that's why we're here». About the semi final, he said: «I don't think it was difficult. We knew our game plan, but we stuck to it. It was just a matter of time before the pucks went in, and once they went in, they just kept going in. We just had to wear them down, they got two chances in their back and their net, and that's probably all they had left of that game. We've been in situations like that before and I think we've grown from that and that just shows tonight that we didn't lose our steam



at all, we just kept pushing through and it paid off for us».

The anticipation for the finals is growing. All eyes are on the North American team itself: will it manage to get the gold medal, or will it have to settle for second place, as the women's team did?

Unstoppable South Korea: one-way 1500m Speed Skating race

On 21 January, South Korean skaters lit up the Palavela arena as a single flag dominated the podium in both the men's and women's 1500m speed skating events. It was a great debut for young South Korean talent Kim Gilli at the FISU Games 2025. The rising star took the lead on the third-to-last lap and never looked back. She crossed the finish line in 2:37.6, a few tenths of a second ahead of her compatriots: the gold medal was hers. Her 2024 was unstoppable: at the World Short Track Championships, she won gold over 1500m and silver over 1000m. Such a great physical condition for her, with a view to the next

major event in Milan-Cortina. After the race, she revealed her favourites: South Korea's Choi Min-jeong and Italy's Arianna Fontana, multiple short-track world champion and 500m gold medallist at the last two Olympic Games. Also, two solid races for Whimin Seo, second, and Geon-hee Kim, bronze. At the last FISU Games in Lake Placid, they finished as reserves in another South Korean triumph. "There's no secret behind my balance on the ice, it's just hard work," said 22-year-old Whi-min Seo after the race. She revealed that she hadn't expected to win, but her goals are ambitious: "I want to be an Olympic gold





medallist," she said confidently. sung, who took up the sport at the age of 11, said his South Korea also dominated the men's 1500m short biggest dream was to win a gold medal at the Winter track race. Gold for Finland and Japan in Cross-Country Relays



The **cross-country relays** in **Pragelato Plan** delivered high-stakes excitement as athletes competed in exciting team events that demanded team work, strategy, and endurance with Finland and Japan clearly coming out as the winners after these two races.

Women's 4 x 7.5 km Relay

The Finnish team secured a convincing victory in the women's relay, crossing the finish line in **1:20:57.0**, **31.2 seconds** ahead of Japan. From **Hanna Ray**'s very first leg, Finland set a strong pace, with **Elsa Torvinen** and **Iida Vuollet** on position two and



three either leading or staying in close contention throughout the race. By the final two legs, Finland had established a clear lead, with anchor skier Anni Lindroos delivering a flawless finish to secure gold. Japan with Chika Honda, Takane Tochitani, Karen Hatakeyama and Kaho Nakajima kept the competition close, showing impressive consistency to finish second in 1:21:28.2. Early in the race, Japan exchanged positions with Finland and France, with only +1.2 seconds separating the top three teams at the first exchange. Although Japan managed to briefly close the gap during Tochitani's leg, they couldn't match Finland's pace in the final rounds. **France** with **Felicie Chappaz**, **Manon Favre Bon vin**, **Julie Marciniak** and **France Pignot** claimed bronze in **1:22:03.5**, **+1:06.5** behind the leaders. Pignot made the race extra exciting for her teammates, when she gave it her all on the final kilometers, passing the Swiss team who had only been 10 seconds ahead of them on the last intermediate time. In the end, her strong skiing on the final stretch let her finish a mesmerizing 37.8 seconds.

FLASH QUOTES Winner: Finland

Lida Vuollet: It was amazing—we're so happy! We talked about it beforehand, and while we didn't think the margin would be this big, we knew we had a chance. We haven't decided how we'll celebrate yet, but it will definitely wait until after Thursday and the





last races. It's hard to put into words what this win means to us—it feels almost unheard of.

Second: Japan

Takane Tochitani: My physical condition was excellent today, and my skis, thanks to the incredible work of our service team, were perfect. The conditions for a good race were definitely there. My coach advised me to lead as much as possible before handing over, and I gave it everything I had. Now, I'm looking forward to a big, delicious meal to celebrate with my teammates! **Third: France**

France Pignot: I can't quite believe it! I was just behind the Swiss athlete, and she was so fast and full of energy—I honestly didn't think I could catch her. But with the support of my friends, family, and the French team, I got this incredible boost of energy on the last uphill. I didn't even look behind me.



Being the last athlete of the relay was stressful. I could barely eat and spent the morning watching funny videos to relax. We imagined all the possible scenarios, and we knew we had strong results this week. Winning bronze feels incredible because the other teams were so strong.

To my amazing teammates: thank you! You trusted me to finish the relay, and it was such an honor. I love being in this position, even if it's a big responsibility. This medal means so much to us, and I'm so proud of what we achieved together.

MEN'S 4 X 7.5 KM RELAY

The men's race was a showcase of intense competition, with Japan (Sho Kasahara, Ikuya Takizawa, Daito Yamazaki, Kanta Sakai) taking gold in 1:08:45.9 after a tightly contested battle. Switzerland, finishing just **+20.9 seconds** behind, put up a strong fight, with their skiers excelling in the second and third legs to keep the race within reach.

The early stages of the race were incredibly close, with Japan, Switzerland, and Finland trading leads. The top three teams were separated by less than a second during the first leg, setting the stage for an intense competition. The win of Japan's team came down to their third skier Daito Yamazaki pulling ahead 40 seconds of the competition on his leg, giving their anchor skier Sakai an amazing lead to secure the victory.

Switzerland (Nolan Gertsch, Silvan Dürrer, Maxime Beguin, Jan Faessler) demonstrated excellent pacing and transitions, but small delays during exchanges allowed Japan to maintain their lead. Finland (Topias Kemppi, Markus Kasanen, Eelis **Valikainen, Nico Bennert)**, finishing in **1:09:20.9** (+**35.0 seconds**), initially led during the early stages of the race. However, they couldn't maintain their momentum in the final legs and ultimately settled for bronze.

Daito Yamazaki: I'm very happy! I just wanted to enjoy my race, and the big time gap I achieved for my fellow teammates is just another good thing to celebrate. The team prepared so well, and our waxers did an incredible job giving us excellent skis. This was a great team effort.

Second: Switzerland

Jan Faessler: It's a great feeling. I tried to catch up





with Japan at the front, but the gap was just too big. We thought we had a realistic chance of medaling, but everything has to work out perfectly, and today it did. There was definitely a lot of pressure—I felt it yesterday already—and I just wanted to finish in a good way. I think I managed to do that, and I'm really happy with how it turned out. Now, I'm looking forward to the medal ceremony and then relaxing with the team, hopefully with some pizza.

Third: Finland

Topias Kemppi: Bronze is okay, but our goal was to win. A medal is a medal, and of course, we're satisfied, but we had our sights set on gold. Our goal is to earn a medal in every competition, so we'll keep working hard to make that happen.

Ski Orienteering Ends with Victory for Finland

PRAGELATO PLAN, 21 January – The **Mixed Sprint Relay** in ski orienteering provided a thrilling display of speed, navigation, and teamwork. Finland emerged victorious in a tightly contested race, holding off Sweden and Switzerland to claim the gold medal.

The **Finnish team** of **Amanda Yli-Futka** and **Niklas Ekström** delivered a stellar performance to finish in **45:10**, just 9 seconds ahead of Sweden. Starting the race conservatively, Finland quickly gained momen-

tum with the second exchange, maintaining a place in the podium through the final exchange. Ekström's navigation and speed in the closing leg secured the hard-fought win, showcasing the team's ability to handle high-pressure situations.

The **Swedish duo** of **Anna Aasa** and **Jonatan Stahl** finished second in **45:19**, narrowly missing out on gold. Sweden led early in the race, with Aasa setting the fastest time on the first leg. Despite a small slip in the middle legs that saw them drop to sixth position,





Stahl's final leg surge brought the team back to claim silver, demonstrating their resilience and determination.

The **Swiss team** of **Delia Giezendanne**r and **Corsin Elias Boos** took bronze in **45:28**, finishing just +18 seconds behind Finland. Switzerland started the race in sixth but steadily climbed the ranks, after the third leg, gaining momentum in the later legs. Boos' consistent navigation and Giezendanner's strong skiing allowed them to secure a podium finish.

Amanda Yli-Futka: I'm so happy—it's absolutely amazing that we could win today. This feels incredible!

Niklas Ekström: It feels amazing—this was the perfect race for me. I focused on staying as stable as possible on my legs, and it really paid off. The snow



in the forest was quite varied today; in some places, it was much faster than in others, which made it a real challenge.

Amanda and I have been on the national team together for three or four years, so achieving this win as a team is really special. We won't be celebrating just yet, though—we might still compete in the 20k cross-country race, so we're keeping our focus for now.

Second: Sweden

Anna Aasa: Every lap was so tight—it made the race really exciting! The organizers did a great job preparing the course with the new snow, and it was a pleasure to compete in these conditions. I can't wait to celebrate this medal with the team, and I want to dedicate it to our amazing waxer who made it all possible.

Jonatan Stahl: It was such a fun race to ski! The weather was great, and the orienteering was challenging



but enjoyable. There was a bit of mud on the tracks, but the conditions overall were good, and our skis worked perfectly. This was our first sprint relay together, but Anna and I have been on the team for five or six years, so it was really special to compete like this. Now, we're looking forward to the prize-giving ceremony and a nice dinner to celebrate!

Third: Switzerland

Delia Giezendanner: This means so much to me. I had a really tough summer with an injury, so it's amazing that my shape is good enough now to win two medals. It's especially cool to achieve this with Corsin—we've been on the team together since 2017. In three weeks, we have the next World Cup, so we can't celebrate too much.

Corsin Elias Boos: Well, maybe we'll have one beer to celebrate! (laughs)

For me, this feels incredible too. My big goal for the season was the sprint, but I sadly missed the podium by four seconds. We've been in the team together since juniors – so to achieve this with Delia now is amazing. The snow today made for some proper ski orienteering in the end—a bit slower and very physical—but we're both quite fit right now, so it worked

out perfectly. PREVIEW: BIATHLON, MASS START – 22 JA-NUARY

Tomorrow, the biathlon competition at Pragelato-Ruà concludes with the Men's 15 km and Women's 12.5 km Mass Start events. Known as the grand finale of biathlon, the mass start features the best athletes competing head-to-head in a thrilling race format where all athletes start simultaneously. With four trips to the shooting range and intense battles on the ski tracks, this event is often considered the highlight of any biathlon program.





However, this year's mass start will have a unique twist, as several medalists and strong contenders won't be at the start line. Teams like Poland and Ukraine, who have dominated many of the earlier events, are already on their way to Val Martello in a different part of the Italian Alps to compete in the European Championships. Their absence opens the door for new athletes to step up and deliver standout performances.

With temperatures remaining mild overnight, the course was treated with water and salt to firm up the surface, followed by a smoothing process with the help of coaches and delegations. This meticulous preparation ensured the athletes had the best possible conditions for the first run, a vital step in such a

technical event. And according to the reactions of the athletes they did a really good job.

The day belonged to the Swiss team, as they dominated the podium. The gold medal was claimed by Sue Piller, who celebrated her third medal of the Games, showcasing her remarkable consistency and skill. Her teammate Amelie Klopfenstein secured the silver medal, adding to Switzerland's triumph. Local hero Margherita Cecere delighted the home crowd by earning the bronze medal, bringing a touch of hometown pride to the event.

The Spectacle of Parallel Giant Slalom Awards Gold to Athletes from Bulgaria and Austria

A spectacular downhill, a head-to-head slalom race, an afternoon of sunshine, music and cheering. On the **Melezet slope in Bardonecchia**, a great sporting event took place yesterday, the kind that will make you miss the atmosphere and emotions of the FISU Games: the Snowboard parallel giant slalom competitions, in which **67 student-athletes**, divided between males and females, challenged each other in exciting one-on-one speed races, boarding down the slope in parallel on two slalom courses. For the **men**, **gold** went to Bulgaria's **Tervel Zamfirov**, who beat **Korea's Junho Ma** in the big final. Bronze went to Italy's **Fabian Lantschner**, who finished ahead of Bulgaria's **Alexander Krashniak** in the small final for third place. In the **women's tour-** Marco Papetti

Kainz, who was faster in the final than Italy's Elisa
Fava. Fava was held back by a mistake at the

COMPETITION REVIEW: FREESTYLE SKIING SKI CROSS ROUND ROBIN (M/W)

BARDONECCHIA, 21 January 2025 – Blue skies returned to track 25 at Sellette this morning for the Round Robin phase of the Ski Cross at these World University Winter Sports Championships, giving the racers good visibility at last. Visibility, but also fresh snow which benefited from very good preparation and ideal temperatures, making for excellent racing conditions today.

The 12 young women and 20 men set off this mor-
ning at 11:00 as planned. The aim of the round robin
is for the competitors to meet each other at least2-

DAY 10: THE TIME TO FIGHT FOR MEDALS IS APPROACHING

The snowy landscape of the Piedmont mountains harmoniously accompanied the two competitions held in Bardonecchia Melezet and Pragelato Rua. Rain instead awaited the hockey athletes outside Torino Pala Tazzoli. Yesterday, the alpine skiing parallel mixed team finals were held after a set of semi-finals that started at 10am. Bardonecchia triumphed for the Swedish, the Swiss and the French teams, after they won the medals. Biathlon awarded Bohdan Borkovskyi (UKR) and Barbara Skrobiszewka (POL), for their outstanding performances in the men's biathlon 12.5km pursuit and the women's biathlon 10km pursuit. Yesterday, the first medals were also awarded in women's hockey, where Canada's team was proclaimed as the winner. Curling is also approaching the podium. Today, January 21st, two men's semi-finals

and two women's semi-finals will be played in Torino Pala Tazzoli to determine who will advance to play the matches for the podium. Freestyle & freeskiing continues in Bardonecchia Sellette, where the cross group heats will take place at 11 a.m. The semi-finals of the men's hockey play-offs will finally be played in Torre Pellice. There the Ukrainians will take on Slovakia at 4pm, while at 8pm the public of the ice rink will witness the challenge between United States and Canada. We are coming to the conclusion of this edition of FISU Games but the surprises are not over yet. Ten finals will be played today in five different disciplines, find out which ones below.


